Mike Berners-Lee

Big People in a Small World: How Can Humans Thrive in the Anthropocene?





Borderlines 2018 sees the inaugural One World Talk, held in partnership with Carlisle One World Centre, this year to be delivered by Mike Berners Lee

This talk will explore how mankind can thrive in an era which has seen such significant

human impact on the Earth's geology and ecosystems, as well as climate change.

Mike Berners-Lee thinks, writes, researches and consults on sustainability and responses to 21st century challenges. He is a professor at Lancaster University's Institute for Social Futures, where he develops practical tools for thinking about the future and researches the global food system. He is the founder of Small World Consulting (SWC), an associate company of Lancaster University, which works with organisations from tech giants to supermarkets.

His books How Bad Are Bananas? The Carbon Footprint Of Everything, and The Burning Question, explore the topics of consumerism, global dynamics and climate change as well as the solutions required to deal with the problem.

Carlisle One World Centre is a local charity addressing global issues. It seeks to raise awareness of the interconnectedness of local and global issues, and how our actions – as individuals, as communities and as a nation – affect the world


The Course of History: Ten Meals That Changed the World

by Ian Fenton. Inspired by Polley's acclaimed collection *Jackself*, and with the poet himself reading his work live, the performance takes the audience on a multi-media journey through an imagined childhood house that is the site of an alternative personal history, and a reflection and 'dream vision' of childhood.

The performance resonates with voices, film, monsters and music, telling a story charged with strangeness and poetry. Lamanby movingly explores how we might hold on to what matters.

exciting and outstanding in its imaginative range and depth of feeling.' His three previous collections are *The Brink, Little Gods* and *The Havocs* (Picador). Both *The Brink* and *The Havocs* were shortlisted for the T.S. Eliot Prize, and *The Havocs* won the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize. His first novel, *Talk of the Town*, won the 2010 Somerset Maugham Award.


Bookworm: A Memoir of Childhood Reading



He has won, and been shortlisted for, a variety of awards for his journalism, and shortlisted for the Saltire Society and Wainwright prizes for his books.

featuring Indian detective Ashwin Chopra and his baby elephant sidekick. The first book in the series, *The Unexpected Inheritance of Inspector Chopra* was a Times bestseller, and a Waterstones Paperback of the Year. Vaseem was born in London, but spent a decade working in India. His latest novel is *Murder at the Grand Raj Palace*.





Carlisle-born M. W. Craven took up a probation officer role in Whitehaven in 1999. Seventeen years later, at the rank of assistant chief officer, he became a full-time author. The Puppet Show, the first in a two-book deal he signed with the Little, Brown imprint, Constable in 2017, was released this June. It has sold in numerous foreign territories and has been optioned for TV by Studio Lambert.

Vaseem Khan will also lead a crime-writing masterclass on Saturday, October 6th at 2pm in the Crown & Mitre Hotel Boardroom



Kathleen Jones is a poet, biographer and novelist, whose subjects include Katherine Mansfield, Norman Nicholson, Catherine Cookson, Christina Rossetti, and the women of the Wordsworth and Coleridge families. Kathleen worked in broadcast journalism and is the author of two novels and four

collections of poetry. She was appointed as a Royal Literary Fund Fellow in 2007.



Medicine now has unprecedented power to alter our lives, but that power has limitations. As he helps patients face transformations both temporary and sustained, Francis draws on history, art, literature, myth and magic to show how the very essence of being human is change.

Gavin Francis is a GP, and the author of *True North* and *Empire Antarctica: Ice, Silence & Emperor Penguins*, which won the Scottish Book of the Year Award and was shortlisted for the Ondaatje Prize and Costa Prize. He also writes for *The Guardian, The Times, London Review of Books and Granta.* He lives in Edinburgh with his wife and children.

Handstand Press is a small publishing company based in Dent and is run by Liz Nuttall. They publish local history books and books by Cumbrian writers.




