



Sugar and Slavery

Like many wellheeled Georgian families, the Atkinson's wealth was acquired at a terrible cost through the labour and lives of enslaved

Africans. Drawing on his ancestors' private correspondence, **Richard Atkinson** pieces together their unsettling story, from a weather-beaten house in Cumbria, to the ruins of their sugar estates in Jamaica. *Mr Atkinson's Rum Contract* is an extraordinary work of detective biography, and a uniquely personal account of one of the most disturbing chapters in Britain's colonial past. Atkinson, a book publisher, lives in London but holds a deep-rooted affection for the north of England, the land of his ancestors.

Paula Hawkins Look What You Started...



Paula Hawkins, the bestselling author of *The Girl on the Train* and Into the Water, is in conversation about her wonderful new novel, *A Slow Fire*

Burning. It's a character-driven tale of love and loss that finds three women caught up in the aftermath of a brutal murder. One is known to be hot-tempered, troubled, maybe even dangerous. Another realises that appearances are deceptive — someone leaving a murder scene covered in blood isn't necessarily the killer. The third, the murder victim's aunt, bears scars and secrets connected to an earlier loss. Innocent or guilty, everyone in this novel is damaged in some way — and someone is damaged enough to kill!

magic, tradition, and a haunting legend. *The First Woman* was shortlisted for the RSL Encore Award and the James Tait Black Prize, and named one of 2020's books of the year by the Sunday Times, Observer, Daily Mail, BBC Culture, Waterstones, Oprah

Magazine, and others. Jennifer Makumbi lectures in Creative Writing at Manchester Metropolitan University. In 2020 she was selected as one of the 100 Most influential Africans by New African magazine.

Two acclaimed writers and two powerhouse series add up to an hour of wickedly good fun, when M. W. Craven and Claire Askew meet to discuss the fine art of crime writing, including how to sustain a series. finding characters who'll go the distance, and deciding how much procedure a police procedural really needs.

In Dead Ground, Craven's latest Washington Poe and Tilly Bradshaw novel, the team is tasked with finding out who bludgeoned a man to death in a Carlisle brothel. Why doesn't the victim's background check out – and is his death linked to a three-year-old heist in which nothing was taken? MW Craven is the 2019 winner of the CWA Gold Dagger award. Askew's Cover Your Tracks

the third in this series, finds D.I. Helen Birch helping a man locate his missing parents and his inheritance. She winds up uncovering the deadly secrets of a seemingly perfect marriage. Askew's debut, All The Hidden Truths, won the inaugural Bloody Scotland Scottish Crime Debut of the Year in 2019.

Sisterhood and Secrecy

Consumed is this year's must-read memoir, from Arifa Akbar, the Guardian's chief theatre critic. When Akbar's sister fell ill, her family didn't realise the seriousness of her condition. Only the day before she died did the family discover she was suffering from tuberculosis. Consumed is a moving story about grief, the redemptive power of art and the mythologies that surround tuberculosis itself. It's an eloquent, moving excavation of family secrets, and a sister's detective story to understand her sibling.

He Walks the Line

Take a compelling trip with journalist Stan L. Abbott in this illustrated talk about Walking the Line: Exploring Settle & Carlisle Country. Widely known as England's most

picturesque line, the Settle to Carlisle Railway crosses the North Pennines between Yorkshire and Cumbria. Built by the Midland Railway company in the 1870s to connect its English network with Scotland, the entire infrastructure is now a Conservation Area in its own right, comprising viaducts, stations, bridges, tunnels, trackside structures and railway workers' cottages. Abbott reveals wonders of architecture and historic remains, along with centuries-old traditions and legends. Abbott's career as a journalist began in York. He has also run a successful publishing business and worked in the airline industry and in tourism in the UK and Europe.

Alan Johnson's thriller, *The Late Train to Gipsy Hill,* finds the former Home Secretary and bestselling memoirist reinvented as a debut novelist, with a fast-paced, warm-hearted story that begins with an unremarkable young man making his unremarkable London commute. But when a beautiful woman he's been too shy to approach holds up a mirror bearing the message "HELP ME" scrawled in mascara, a terrifying chase ensues. Along the way there are hair-raising encounters with Russian mobsters, the FSB, and even the Metropolitan police. Johnson, a Labour MP for 20 years, is the author of three award-winning memoirs. He hosts a podcast called *How To Change the World*, and writes an Agony Uncle column for *Saga* Magazine.



One of Scotland's most acclaimed and prolific authors of award-winning nature books, **Jim Crumley**, turns his distinctive eye on the Lake District, one of our busiest national parks. 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choices than ever, society continues to define women by the standards of less enlightened times. Dr Agarwal founded the research think tank The 50 Percent Project. She writes regularly for the Guardian, Prospect. Forbes. and New Scientist. In 2018 she won the Diverse Wisdom Writing Award from Hay House Publishing, and was named one of the 100 influential women in social

Fiction in a Flash

Flash fiction (aka micro-fiction, sudden fiction, and postcard fiction) is a very short story that might run to a couple of words, or a couple of pages. Northumberland-based author Sarah Davy looks at examples of different and unusual forms, at using titles to tell stories. and at hermit crab forms (flash with a form borrowed from something else, such as lists, recipes, etc.). Participants will work toward completing a 100-300 word piece over the course of the session, and be advised on resources about where to read and submit their work.

Awards in 2020, and won the Women On The Wall flash fiction competition in 2018. In 2019-2020, she was writer in residence at Forum Books in Corbridge.
