






Did you know that droving was once a vital part of the Cumbrian economy? Learn more about the history of cattle droving from Scotland and Ireland through Cumbria and south, in this fascinating talk. It's an exploration of historical

developments in north-western England through the experience of one family, from the start of regular trading in the early 1600s, to its decline in the 19th century. Roebuck explains why droving was practised and how it grew into the largest traffic in agricultural produce that these islands have seen. He examines droving's influence on agriculture and its contribution to general economic development.

In this illustrated talk, Robert Twigger takes us along as companions on his trip on foot across the Lake District to discover the secrets of its thirtysix islands. He uncovers their fascinating histories, from the location of aristocratic homes to spots that inspired Beatrix Potter, from kennel islands for hunting

dogs to the model for Arthur Ransome's Swallows and Amazons. Along his journey, Twigger discovered that many islands were uninhabited except by wildlife and found some were easy to reach, others more remote - but each had something special to offer. This is sure to be a memorable celebration of one of Britain's most beloved walking destinations.

Everything is True, is Roopa Farooki's account of being a junior doctor working on the frontline of the Covid pandemic. It's an unflinching, powerful, and surprisingly uplifting story of physical and mental survival. In early 2020, just after her sister's death from cancer, Farooki found herself plunged into another

crisis, a critical battle being fought in hospitals across the country. This is the story of the first forty days of the Covid-19 crisis, as it happened on the frontlines of A&E and the acute medical wards. It's about her personal struggle with grief, and the more public battle for her patients' and colleagues' survival. It's an exhilarating memoir of holding on to what it is that makes us human.

a site of joy, solidarity and sexual expression, but in urban centres around the world, they are closing. In the wake of this cultural demolition, *Gay Bar* takes us to London, San Francisco and Los Angeles, focusing on the 1990s post-AIDS-

crisis years, to present day, introducing those who lived and loved in these spaces. Tracking the protean aesthetics of masculinity and gayness, Atherton Lin conjures the strobe lights and throbbing music, the costumes and the categories, and the scent of male tangled bodies. The story of his own experiences as a mixed-race gay man, *Gay Bar* is a serious critical inquiry, a love story, and an epic night out to remember.

Frequently described as the "Poet Laureate of Twitter," (or the Banksy of the poetry world), popular poet Brian Bilston makes a return visit to Borderlines to talk about — and read from — his new anthology, *Days Like These*. This collection of 365 poems attempts to shake off the

shackles of the Gregorian calendar by sharing a strange event that happened on each day around the world. Some events are well known, others obscure, such as the January day in 1902 when New York banned flirting. All are accompanied by a poem written in response.

Myers brings a unique perspective to modern dating, skewing traditional tropes, and bringing queer romance to the forefront. His work features LGBTQ+ characters in all their messy-yetmarvellous splendour.

Combining an extensive range of Greek and Latin sources with a sound understanding of archaeology, Riley describes an epic journey from Rome to Hadrian's Wall at the empire's northwestern frontier.

flee for their lives—starting new lives in the UK. There, her grandmother became involved with a hostel for young girls taken out of Europe by the Kindertransport programme - initially the hostel was in Newcastle but, following bombing raids, moved to the comparative safety of Windermere. This is a richly detailed story of a family facing wartime challenges, featuring first-hand accounts of girls saved by the Kindertransport, who lived in the Cumbrian hostel.
